#### THE 2023 ANNUAL SUSAN FUND SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS CEREMONY



The 42nd Annual Susan Fund Scholarship Reception was once again held in June at the Easton Public Library to celebrate the accomplishments of 25 inspired individuals. They continue to demonstrate the ability to overcome their cancer diagnoses; we believe they will be future leaders and make our community a better place.



The event commenced with a welcome from the Fund's Chair, Jeff Booth. In addition to recognizing the volunteer Board of Directors, Jeff praised the Fund's Founder and Chair-Emeritus, Ann Lloyd. "Thanks to her vision and dedication over four decades, The Susan Fund has distributed more than two million dollars since its inception."

Robbi Hartt then introduced a special opportunity for Susan Fund recipients and their support network. Located in the Berkshires, "The Willow" at Mill River Village House was offered as a space to be away from home while still having all the comforts of home. The tranquil setting may act as a place of respite, healing, or celebration for guests to reconnect and relax for a few days.





Susan's older brother, David Lloyd, then offered a remembrance of his strong and spirited sister. David reflected on Susan's confident demeanor throughout her treatment and how her positive attitude kept her family's spirits elevated during that difficult period. David proudly noted that The Susan Fund is, "a living and breathing testament to Susan."

David was followed by 2023's featured recipient, Josh Rubinstein, a four-time Susan Fund scholar, who was honored to speak at the Reception. Josh expressed how those who are a part of The Susan Fund community, "have gained not just memories, but also second families; large support systems that inspire, root, and most of all reinforce ourselves with the tools needed to move on from this terrible disease." Josh believes The Susan Fund scholarships he received will allow him to achieve his dreams of becoming a pediatric oncologist and make the world a better place.

The ceremony concluded with Susan Fund Board Member, Kathy DiGiovanna, providing a brief biography of each recipient; highlighting their accomplishments and future endeavors. All 25 recipients were deserving of the grant awards received and we look forward to hearing about their future success.



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
# FROM the CHAIRMAN / ABOUT SUSAN

#### An Update From The Susan Fund Chairman Jeff Booth

It has been another rewarding year for The Susan Fund. We celebrated the Fund's 42nd year, distributed a record amount of scholarships, updated our website to include new photo galleries and a video of this year's reception, and more. Most importantly, the Board had the pleasure of meeting each of the 25 people who received 2023 scholarships. It is impossible to overstate what an honor it is to spend time with these courageous individuals and hear about their journeys.

Because our recipients can apply for scholarships every year, we get to see many of them throughout their academic lives, we watch them grow, and we learn about the ways they "pay it forward" to help others. In fact, two of our Board members recently experienced medical issues and were aided by previous Susan Fund scholarship recipients, first a nurse at the Norwalk Hospital Emergency Room and second, an EMT in Trumbull.

A special vote of thanks to our all-volunteer Board, who make it possible to keep The Susan Fund moving forward in its fifth decade. They also make it possible for the Fund to distribute more than 90% of incoming donations directly for scholarships. Finally, a huge thank you to everyone who financially supports The Fund through their generous donations.



Susan Davis Lloyd was a typical all-American teenager, entering her senior year at Staples High School, when she discovered she had osteogenic sarcoma. Despite having her leg amputated, Susan continued to participate in school activities and hold two jobs. A cheerleader and an outstanding student, she was accepted to Colgate University. Unfortunately, her chemotherapy treatments were not effective, and she was unable to begin college.

When Susan died, her family and many friends wanted to do something positive to remember her. The Susan Fund was established with the goal of helping other young people who have been treated for cancer attain their educational goals. The Fund has continued to grow, and during the past 40 years has awarded more than \$2 million in scholarships. Through the generosity of others, Susan's memory remains very much alive.

#### Classmate Robin (Perry) Rothman Remembers Susan

Susan was a friend and an inspiration to me. We ran track together in junior high school; worked together at the movie theater in high school, and lived just down the road from one another. I remember her long flowing blonde hair before she lost it to treatments; her infectious smile which never left her beautiful face; her sense of humor; her determination as she fought cancer.

Susan was someone I looked up to, especially in the end. She was so brave. I remember visiting her at her home, it must have been near the end of her life, and she was in bed in her room and I sat down on her bed. We talked for a short time and even had a couple of laughs. She was in so much pain, but she never told me until I stood up and she winced from just that slight movement. I believe she was hurting the whole time I was sitting on the bed with her, but she wanted me to be close so she put up with the pain. She will not be forgotten and remains an inspiration.



#### WHAT THE SUSAN FUND MEANS TO ME - CRAIG HETZER



OK, whoa! My name is Craig and I was among the first recipients of a scholarship from The Susan Fund back in —eh hem!— the early 1980s! I was a contemporary of Susan's! A teenager who had just finished nearly two years of aggressive chemotherapy and who had multiple surgeries as treatment for osteogenic sarcoma., It is challenging to think back that far believe it or not! It may sound odd, but The Susan Fund scholarship I received reminded me of the friends I had made during my treatment who were dealing with many of the same challenges. Even though I had unwavering support from family and previous friends (for which I will always be dizzyingly grateful) one aspect of having cancer that struck me, and struck me hard, was how searingly alone I felt in it except when I was with other teens who were also getting treated for bone cancer. And so, it kind of blew my mind when I learned of The Susan Fund. And knowing that the impetus for the Fund was in remembrance of Susan who also had osteogenic sarcoma, it felt like a belonging, an emotional support of some kind, as well as financial help.

I remember my crew at the pediatric oncology ward at Memorial Sloan–Kettering. There was Djenab, soft spoken and kind; there was Steven who took me under his wing and who sported a mohawk until it dwindled down to fuzz; and there was Jen who like me loved to laugh. Jen and I had our major surgeries on our legs at the same time, and we convinced the nurses to time our pain medications so that one of us could be rolled into the other's hospital room for what we called cocktail hour. We coped as best we could each in our own unique way, and we had community when there was joy, when there was sadness, when there was anguish. I can't imagine the experience without them. It was a hard time and one that brought home to me that sometimes life just sucks; it sounds a bit silly, but it had never really occurred to me that my life could be in jeopardy until then.

The money from The Susan Fund helped me attend Wesleyan University in Middletown Connecticut. At the time going to college was like a new beginning for me and an opportunity to acknowledge my illness, but also to transition away from it. Wesleyan was the funky and rigorous liberal arts school I had hoped it would be where I was able to take classes like West African Dance, New

German Cinema, and Black Women and Their Fictions. I majored in English and wrote a thesis — a collection of remembrances from having been ill — called Declaring the Distance. And when I graduated (and, we're talking still in the 80s!) I drove across the United States with my dearest friend, and ended up in California where I have been since.

I currently live in the Hollywood Hills in Los Angeles with my boyfriend Raymond. I've been working in the book and paper gift industry, most recently for two great companies—Knock Knock and Em & Friends. But I am most content cooking, and being outside doing yard and gardening work.

I am thankful that The Susan Fund found me and reached out with their newsletter. I am so proud to be able to give back now. And, honored to have been among the first group of recipients.

Congratulations to all the recent recipients. Go forth!

About 10 years ago, I was honored to be a recipient of a grant from The Susan Fund that was integral in sending me to Ithaca College. Without their help, I'm not sure I would have been able to attend the school at which I had such an incredible, formative four years. I was honored then, and am both honored and grateful now.

I underwent treatment for Stage III Melanoma when I was nine years old, and as you all can imagine, there are very few silver linings to going through such an experience. Many ask about Make-A-Wish, mostly because they're the most widely known, but The Susan Fund grants wishes that I would argue are more important. Make-A-Wish sent me to Alaska for a week, but The Susan Fund sent me to Ithaca College for four years. I brought home salmon from Alaska, but I brought home a college degree from Ithaca. I currently live in Los Angeles with my wife, who is a pediatrician of all things, and continue to view The Susan Fund as a group of people who set me up for long-term success. Charlie was 23 years old when he passed away last year after battling cancer four times. Charlie received his first Susan Fund scholarship in 2018 and attended Fairfield University where he was majoring in Business and minoring in Psychology.

Charlie played as a goalie for Fairfield's Co-Op hockey team. It was his passion and he was an outstanding goaltender. His coaches described him as "coachable, passionate and energetic... possessing an unparalleled work ethic." The current Fairfield goalie stated, "Charlie's obviously very important to Fairfield. He set the culture. So, it's nice to build off his legacy."

Fairfield retired Charlie's number in a ceremony held before the start of the game. The program framed a No. 30 jersey that will hang at the Wonderland of Ice in Bridgeport. Two balloons making up a large "30" floated behind the home bench, and the rink lobby was full of photos including Charlie's family and friends, as well as Charlie with Rangers and Bruins players.

Charlie's parents, Anthony and Jenny Capalbo, his brother Will, and his girlfriend, Peyton Siegel were in attendance. They also unveiled a painting by the Norwalk graffiti artist who goes by 5ivefingaz on Instagram. It hangs near the entryway from the rink to the Fairfield locker room. Charlie's younger brother, Will Capalbo wore 30 to commemorate his brother's hockey legacy and stated, "Now we have Charlie up in the corner. He's going to be able to watch every game from that view. We're very grateful for that picture up there."

Hey folks,

My name is Tom Cole and I'm a pediatric cancer survivor and prior recipient of The Susan Fund scholarship. In 2011, I was treated with chemo and radiotherapy for Ewing's Sarcoma, a pediatric bone cancer that affects about one in one million children worldwide. After finishing high school, The Susan Fund was generous enough to award me a scholarship to attend UConn studying political science. Over time, I realized this wasn't the place for me, and I eventually dropped out of school and moved on with life. Life moves in mysterious ways, and has brought me back to The Susan Fund in just such a surprising way.

I am working now as an EMT with Trumbull EMS, a "third service" model agency that serves the Town of Trumbull as a municipal agency, responding to ~6,000 calls for service a year in a town of ~37,000 people. I love working in emergency medical services. I know what it is like to be the patient, and I know what to look for in a good provider. I strive to emulate all the wonderful doctors, nurses and techs that helped me get better when I was sick. I get to help people on their worst days and constantly advance my knowledge of medicine and patient care while serving the town I grew up in.

Recently, I bumped into a nice woman and her husband while at work. It took a little story swapping to finally put it together, but me and his wife: Susan Baron realized that the passing thought of "she/he looks familiar!" was spot on, and we'd met through The Susan Fund. It was so nice to see her again and she asked me to update all the kind folks involved with the Fund on what's been happening with me.

I am more than happy to say to you all that I'm doing excellent and will continue my career in medicine. I plan on attending paramedic school next year, through the Bridgeport Hospital - Echo Hose Ambulance partner program. Paramedics are advanced providers who can truly save lives in the field, and I can't wait to be a part of patient's stories the way my disease, providers and The Susan fund are a part of mine.


## "WILLOW" AT MILL RIVER VILLAGE HOUSE RETREAT




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
